From the Principal

Enrolments for 2020

Over the past two weeks we have been conducting interviews with new families with a child starting Foundation in 2020. It has been great to be able to interview families with Fr Des.

Letters confirming enrolments will now be sent to families. At this stage we look to have our Foundation places filled. We do keep a limited number of places for Catholic families who may move into the area in the next few months. The orientation program will commence in Term 4.

Changes for 2020

It is important that you please inform the school in writing by the end of August, if your child will not be returning in 2020. This gives us the opportunity to offer places to new families who wish to enrol.

Junior School Production

Our 2019 Productions are to be held in the same venue as our 2017 production. The ticket allocation is exactly the same as it was in 2017 except that we are using Try Booking instead of managing the bookings at the front office.

The venue has 488 available seats at River Gum Performing Arts Centre. We have looked at the number of junior families for the first production and have worked out an allocation so that all families can see the concert. By allocating three tickets per family, we can ensure every family has the opportunity to see the concert.

If you have a pre-school child, and you are happy for your child to sit on your knee, you do not need to purchase a ticket for them.

The tickets will be open from the Monday 12th August.

⇒ From Monday 12th August to Monday 26th August 2019 with the maximum tickets you can purchase will be set to three.

⇒ From the 27th August until sold out, we will open up the tickets for general sale with no restrictions.

Families may make arrangements with other families who may not need their allocation of tickets for the production. Unfortunately the school or try Booking cannot vary this arrangement.

Please note if you wait there is no guarantee that the tickets will not be sold out prior to the 27th August. So book early so you do not miss out. Once sold out there are no further tickets available.

Education in faith

'Ask, and it will be given to you'.

Luke 11: 1-13

This Gospel reminds us of three things. First of all the disciples asked Jesus how to pray and he gave them a model we call the Our Father. Jesus gave the disciples a form of prayer that praises and petitions God. Next there was the example of a friend who came in the middle of the night to another's house asking for bread. The visitor awoke his friend with a plea for bread, but the sleeping friend did not want to be

disturbed. Perhaps it would not be their friendship that got the first man his loaf of bread, but his persistence. So, the only way to continue his night's

sleep was for the second man to give his friend the bread. In this parable, Jesus made clear that we need to be persistent in prayer. Finally, Jesus asked what father would hand his son a snake when asked for a fish, or a scorpion when asked for an egg. The point of this illustration was to show the disciples that God would give us the most important gift, the Holy Spirit.

It is easier for parents to appreciate the love God has for each of us. We strive to care for our children and provide the things necessary for their well being. We see to it that they have nutritious meals rather than junk food each day. We find a way to provide warm clothing and shoes in the cold weather. We don't hand our children something that would harm them when they ask for something that would nourish or protect them. We learn from this week's Gospel that the greatest gift God can give us is the Holy Spirit. Like a child, we only need to stretch out our arms and be open to receive this gift.

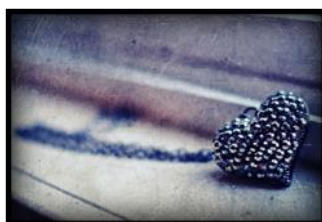
As you pray the Our Father this week, have each family member reword the prayer in a way that brings meaning to that person's life in the twenty-first century. What is the daily bread you require? What is it that you really need most? When you ask for sins to be forgiven, what are they? What are the hurts you need to forgive someone else for? What are the things that tempt us not to follow God's ways? As your family prays this week, focus on each phrase and encourage everyone to think about exactly what they are saying or asking for when they say the words of this familiar prayer.

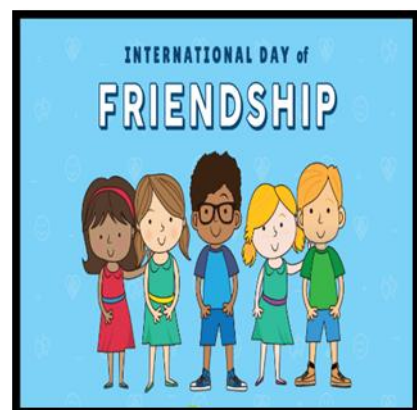

Basketloads of caring

Lynbrook's St Francis De Sales Primary School has collected baskets of food to help the needy.

During term two, students gathered about 800 food items for charity organisation St Vincent de Paul in Hampton Park.

"It was a great achievement," students Alicia and Madison said.

"We helped them load the cars and this food will now be distributed to the people in need within our community."

The food was collected in four coloured baskets representing each of the school's house teams.

The initiative was part of the Mini Vinnies program, where students aim to increase social justice awareness and fundraise for those in need.

On the 28th of June St Francis De Sales'

Grade 5/6 Mini Vinnies action team participated in Dandenong's St John's Regional College Make a Difference (MAD) day.

The students walked five kilometres before taking part in a liturgy and announcing they had raised a total of \$370.

The money will go towards Wellsprings for Women in Dandenong and the Lasallian Foundation which is developing schools for children in Pakistan.

Students Keava and Isabella said they had much deeper understanding of how they could make a difference to people's lives both in the community and overseas.

"As the Social Justice Action Team it is our responsibility to develop actions that will help as many people as we can and be able to live with dignity and life's essentials such as food, shelter and education," they said.

GRADE 5/6 INTERSCHOOL SPORTS

This term we only have 3 Interschool Sports games against the other schools in our District. We already played our first match against Rivergum Primary School last Friday and our next games will be in Week 7 and 9. During the weeks we are not playing, students will be training with their coaches each Friday morning from 9 – 10.

GRADE 3/4 INTERSCHOOL SPORTS TASTER

This term we have decided to organise rotational sports activities for Grades 3/4. On the days we don't have Interschool Sports the Grade 3/4 students will go out after the Grade 5/6 training session from 10 – 11 to try each of the Winter Interschool Sports. They will be involved in a different sport each week: badminton, kickball, basketball, football and handball. We are hoping that with this exposure students will have a better knowledge of the sports when they get to Grade 5/6 and have to choose a sport they would like to participate in. Next term we hope to continue this program and provide the opportunity for the Grade 3/4 students to experience the Summer Interschool Sports: netball, volleyball, tball, soccer and cricket.

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Catholic Education Office has provided all Victorian Catholic schools with access to Minecraft: Education Edition to support transformative teaching and learning. This term Senior classes will use this platform in Digital Technology classes with learning linked to the Chemical Science Inquiry unit

What is Minecraft: Education Edition?

Minecraft: Education Edition is a rich, open collaboration and learning platform that supports curriculum-based learning while encouraging students to think for themselves and collaborate with peers to transform their learning.



What are the benefits for using Minecraft: Education Edition?

- Builds skills around particular subject such as science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), history, geography or coding.
- Supports students to engage in virtual learning experiences that directly link and expand on the subjects being taught in the classroom.
- Teaches students to be 'digital citizens' through the use of an online system where they need to work together to solve problems.
- Promotes creativity, problem solving and critical thinking.
- Allows students to actively collaborate with their classmates on school work.
- Helps students build working relationships with each other. Promotes knowledge sharing as students guide each other on how to perform tasks.
- The Chemistry Update allows students to experiment with chemical reactions safely.
- Portfolios and cameras in Minecraft: Education Edition allows students to provide evidence of their learning for assessment.

How is this different to my child playing Minecraft at home?

- The Education Edition of Minecraft has been specifically created to be used in educational settings. A clear learning objective is required for successful experiences in Minecraft: Education Edition.
- Access to the platform is teacher-led with teachers having access to additional functionality that allows them to control the world - including locking down areas and the ability to move student avatars.

How is my child safe while playing Minecraft: Education Edition?

- Access to Minecraft: Education Edition is through a school generated Office 365 account which will be activated when we are ready to use the program.
- Given the nature of Internet based "cloud" computing a student can access M:EE at home with parental permission by downloading this.
- While in school the teacher can monitor the Minecraft environment and the actions students undertake within the world. When a student is accessing the platform outside the classroom environment no monitoring from a teacher is present, therefore we recommend, as with any online activities, that students are supervised by a parent at home if you have given permission.

Purchasing tickets for the 2019 SFS Productions

Sound Engineer Recording on Friday 2nd August

On Friday 2nd August, Michael Lawton, a sound engineer, will be coming to SFS to record (audio) the children singing their Home Group's song in the Productions. The purpose of recording vocals is because it is quite easy to forget to sing while performing. Home Group teachers handed out copy of lyrics for each Home Group this week. If possible, I encourage children to listen to the song at home and practise singing the lyrics.

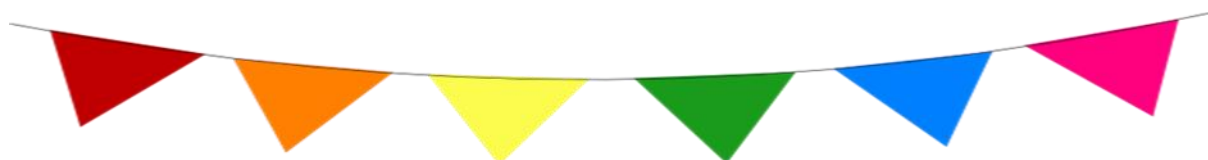

BeYou

BeYou is a resource and framework which provides educators with knowledge, resources and strategies for helping children achieve their best possible mental health.



This week I focused with some children in social skills groups, on having an optimistic mind set as opposed to a pessimistic mind set and how this can really benefit the children in being successful at school. Researchers have spent a lot of time studying people who think positively. It turns out that an optimistic attitude helps us be happier, more successful, and healthier. Optimism can protect against depression — even for people who are at risk for it. An optimistic outlook makes people more resistant to stress. Optimism may even help people live longer. The best thing about optimism is you can learn it, even if your outlook tends to be more pessimistic.

This week's fact sheet from the BeYou **website** is all about

confidence and **optimism**.

Self-esteem is an important part of confidence

Having good self-esteem means accepting and feeling positive about yourself. Confidence is not just feeling good but also knowing you're good at something.

Helpful ways of thinking include:

- believing that if you try, you can succeed
- finding positive ways to cope with failure that encourage having another go
- enjoying learning for its own sake by competing with your own performance – not with others
- making sure that goals are achievable by breaking down large tasks or responsibilities into small steps

knowing you can ask for help if you need it.

Confidence involves dealing well with disappointment

Everyone fails to achieve their goals sometimes. And this isn't a bad thing. Families and educators can build children's ability to deal with challenges when they:

- respond sympathetically and with encouragement
- help children focus on what they can change to make things better, instead of thinking that the situation is unchangeable or that there's something wrong with them

challenge "I can't" thinking by showing and saying you believe in them and reminding them of what they've achieved.

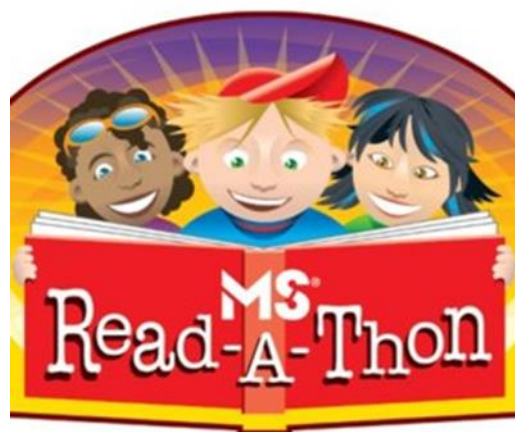

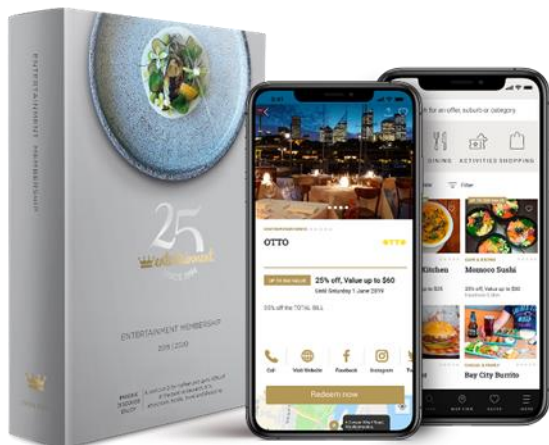
