



### From the Principal

A vision statement needs to be a statement that everyone from a foundation student to an adult, staff member and parent knows and can state. It needs to be uniquely about St Fancies de Sales and it needs to be lived. It is vitally important statement as it influences all we do and all we stand for. It needs to challenge us and inspire us to create the future we desire.

We are close to the vision for St Francis de Sales. We will now consult with both students and parents. We will do further refining with this feedback and in partnership will get to the final vision statement. Ingrid was very impressed with our work and we are very excited to complete the process in the coming days.

### **School Hall Update**

We are dependent on a capital grant from the government to build a school hall. A new hall will cost over \$4 million and we could not fund this while still paying off the loans on the three learning spaces and the administration building that we currently are committed to. However with funds promised by the government to Catholic Education over the next four years, we hope to be successful in obtaining a grant very soon. Competing with us for a grant are new schools in need of learning spaces and in needy socio-economic suburbs. However we are not leaving any stone unturned to present our case for a hall. We have an application in for consideration. If unsuccessful this year we will try again as we believe we are close and it will be our turn soon.

This week I met with our architects to revise our plans so we are more competitive. The original plans are now quite old and costly. We have already been told that we would never get the 6 million plus needed for a hall with changing rooms and showers. We needed to consider our non-negotiables and considered the plan in light of today's needs. Angela and I worked on some of these changes with our architects this week. We want our school to have the best chance to get the funding. We also want a hall that is practical and contemporary in keeping with our school and our needs. The importance of light and openness in the design was communicated to our architect. We are looking forward to seeing the updates early next term. Having the new plans will mean we will be ready to proceed if we are successful this year or if not will position us better for our next application. Let us all pray for the good news very soon!

### 'See that you are prepared'.

Luke 12: 32 - 48

Jesus told the disciples not to be afraid, but rather to get sturdy purses to hold all they will receive from God. If they served God, their reward would be great—but it would not be the reward of worldly wealth. In the second part of the Gospel, Jesus preached the message of watchfulness and being ready for his return. In a servant explanation of his point, Jesus told them that God would be so happy to see them at the banquet that God would put on an apron and cook a meal for them. This is similar to the message Jesus gave the disciples at the Last Supper when he washed their feet in service.

When the third millennium arrived, many people worried that the world would end. We all read accounts of predictions citing signs and scripture. Mostly the mood was one of fear and anxiety. This week's Gospel assures us that we have nothing to fear. Our only responsibility is to be ready for Jesus' return. We also hear that we

have been entrusted with this Good News. So now what do we do with it? Most likely we know we are basically good people, good parents, and good disciples. But is there something more we can do, or does some part of our responsibility need attention? During these summer days, we might quietly reflect on how we view the end times and check our readiness. How are we doing with the Good News we've been given?

Look around your home and see evidence of where Jesus is present. What will people know about your family and its faith when they walk into your home? What items, activities, or actions in your home show visitors that you are ready for Jesus if he were to return for you today? After considering all you do, share with one another if you think there is more or something else you could do to prepare for Jesus' return. Perhaps you will think of things you should stop doing. Try to help one another in each person's efforts to serve others.

### The loss of healthy rites of passage

Rites of Passage have always been a significant part of community life, until now. Each stage of a person's life was marked and celebrated including the significant step of moving into adulthood.

The shift from childhood to adulthood has always been marked by a rite of passage, which represents entry to the adult world and the rights that go with it. This new set of rights is also accompanied by a responsibility to serve and contribute to the community.

### The loss of healthy rites of passage

For many young people Schoolies Week, the annual Year 12 endless party, is the only rite of passage they have. The loss of meaningful rites of passage is having disastrous consequences on young people.

Too often we see young men in their twenties and beyond acting like boys in constant need of acknowledgement from their peers, dodging responsibility and still seeking approval from their mother. Many young women are stuck in perpetual adolescence, more worried about how they look than how they can contribute to their communities.

### Adults have a role to play

It's the role of adults to recognise and bring out children's strengths and natural gifts so they can contribute fully to their communities as adults. One of the most significant roles of the elderly is to care for and pass on wisdom to the young. Not surprisingly in the past it has been the elders who were responsible for overseeing the Rites of Passage and their timely delivery.

Rites of Passage are not supposed to be done in isolation. As a child becomes a young adult parents also need to take a step and move to the next stage in their lives. Each new stage of development for a child or young person represents a new beginning for parents as well.

Unfortunately, elderhood is not highly coveted or respected in these modern times and there is a global marketing campaign telling us that youth is the desirable and only really acceptable life stage. When adulthood is not fully appreciated or understood, then it's little wonder that many young people are hanging on to their adolescence well into their twenties. Some never make the leap into adulthood.

Families and communities can rediscover the notion of rites of passage and begin to invent their own pathways to adulthood, complete with markers and appropriate recognition. They can put their own celebrations in place that mark significant ages, and the all-important transition to adulthood. These celebrations should include a bringing

together of significant adults and a passing on of wisdom and stories from past generations to a young person.

These rites of passage can be creative, must be inclusive and need to be appropriate to each family or community situation.

The lead roles have demonstrated these values through their commitment to learning their lines and performing to the best of their ability. The children have been giving feedback to each other and watching the seniors perform and practicing performing in front of the seniors. The students have also thought about the concept of transformation and how they can transform themselves to portray their character in the production such as a pirate or a sea creature.



### **Student Well-Being**

**Beyou** is a resource and framework which

provides educators with knowledge, resources and strategies for helping children achieve their best possible mental health. At SFS, we are a very multicultural school, which makes our school unique and special. This week's fact sheet from the BeYou website is all about what makes a healthy family.



### Healthy families

### What do these look like?

In healthy family relationships, people trust and rely on each other for support, love, affection and warmth. Families often share common goals and work together to reach those goals (for example, children and young people may help their families get the dinner dishes done so that everyone can relax).

Family members feel safe and connected to one another. Sometimes these relationships involve conflict, which is a normal part of family life. Conflict can occur between adults, children and young people. In healthy relationships, these conflicts are dealt with in a safe and respectful way. Healthy family relationships mean that positive interactions outnumber the difficult times. Adults experiencing difficult life situations can provide learning opportunities in teaching and modelling coping strategies – children and young people shouldn't be burdened with stress, but it's helpful for them to see families successfully managing it with positive coping strategies.

The key qualities of a strong family unit identified by Australians in the Family Strengths Research Project were:

- communication listening to each other and communicating with openness and honesty
- togetherness sharing similar values and beliefs that create a sense of belonging and bonding
- sharing activities spending time together doing things they enjoy (for example, sports, reading, camping or playing games)
- affection showing affection and care regularly through words, hugs, kisses and thoughtfulness
- support offering and asking for support, with family members knowing they will receive help, encouragement and reassurance from one another
- acceptance understanding, respecting and appreciating each family member's unique qualities
- commitment seeing family wellbeing as a first priority and acting accordingly with commitment and loyalty

**resilience** – being able to tolerate difficulties and adapt to changing situations in positive ways.

The biggest challenges in family relationships were highlighted as communication breakdown, parenting issues and difficult relationship dynamics.

### Respectful Relationships

At Saint Frances de Sales, we teach Respectful Relationships. This program promotes and models respect, positive attitudes and behaviours. It teaches our children how to build healthy relationships, resilience and confidence.

### Risk factors in families

There are many reasons why some individuals are more vulnerable than others to developing behavioural difficulties and mental health issues. Risk factors for children and young people are things that increase the likelihood of mental health issues developing.

Risk factors within the family include:

- family conflict, instability or separation
- lack of involvement with children and young people, or inconsistent parenting
- family violence, child abuse or neglect
- mental health issues or substance abuse
- a serious illness or disability
- financial difficulties.

### Protective factors in families

Protective factors decrease the chance of an individual experiencing mental health issues. These are related to good outcomes for children and young people, and serve to protect them if they're exposed to risk.

### Protective factors within the family include:

- strong and stable family relationships for example, consistent, caring relationships
- supportive parenting for example, being available to listen to and talk with children and young people
- strong family values for example, a shared understanding of how to treat others
- consistency in routines and limits for example, responding the same way to children or young people's behaviour.

### mConnect and Wellsprings for Women

The next M connect group meeting will be on **Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> August** at **11.30am** in the community room. The topic for this session will be healthy cooking, looking at family meals and preparing healthy lunches and snacks for kids. All parents are most welcome to attend. 


