'All who exalt themselves shall be humbled and all who humble themselves shall be exalted'. Luke 14: 1, 7–14

Jesus often had confrontations with some of the religious leaders about meals or the Sabbath. He was sure to be tested in the cir-



cumstances of this week's Gospel since he was eating a meal with the religious leaders on the Sabbath! At the meal, Jesus noticed that the guests hurried to recline at the place of honor. He taught them

that when they were invited to a wedding feast, they should sit at the lowest place. If they sat at the highest place and someone higher than they came in, their host would approach the lower guest and ask him to move down. This, of course, would be a source of humiliation. Instead, if the guest took the lower seat, the host would come to him as a friend and invite him to take a higher seat. Then, all would look on this person with great admiration. Jesus also advised them on giving a dinner. Instead of inviting close friends and relatives and all the people who might repay the invitation, Jesus encouraged his listeners to invite those who could never reciprocate. Jesus explained that by doing this the host's place would be insured at the heavenly banquet.

Most often the role of a parent is cast in humility. When we think back on our own childhoods, even if we have taken the time to tell our parents how much we appreciate all they did for us, children rarely take in the whole scope of what their parents do for them. Yes, in some cases we might even say what parents sacrifice for them, but it's hard to call something a sacrifice when it's given out of love. Still, parents know what it means to provide for someone who cannot repay us. We don't expect our children to repay us financially for what we've given them in food, clothing, shelter, education, and entertainment. Not only is it not realistic, but it's just not the way it works! We understand the meaning of this Gospel in connection with our children, but how much greater our understanding will be if we reach beyond our own family to provide for someone in our society who cannot begin to repay us.

Using your parish bulletin, local newspaper, or knowledge you have of your community, find someone or a group of people who cannot repay a kindness from you. Decide as a family what you will do to serve this person or group. Perhaps you can help serve a meal at a soup kitchen or hunger center. Maybe you can provide clothing or transportation to a family struggling at this time. You might look for non-profit organizations that rely on volunteers in order to provide services to the community. When you have finished your service experience, read this passage again and share together how you lived the Gospel message this week.

This term the 5/6 Social Justice Team: Mini Vinnies, have been learning about the important people that helped establish the St Vincent de Paul Society. The Mini Vinnies would now like to share what they have learnt:

St Vincent de Paul - By:Jayda, Aura, Mason, Tahlia, Dominic, and Dylon

St Vincent de Paul was born on the 24th of April 1581 in Pouy, France. He was an only child. His mother's name was Bertrande de Moras and his father's name was Jean de Paul. He studied at the University of Toulouse from 1597 to 1604 and then he studied at the University of Paris. St Vincent de Paul helped the poor and served them as a parish Priest, he also followed in Jesus' footsteps. The society was named after him for starting the cause and helping people in need.

St Louise de Marillac By Cienna, Keava, Olivia, Darshan, Christian and Onindu

St Louise de Marillac was born in Aurergne, France on the 12th of August 1591. Growing up she didn't know her mother so her father raised her. In France she was one of the most educated women in her

time. Since she grew up in a wealthy family, she didn't have to work. In her spare time she helped abandoned children, wounded soldiers, slaves and people who were sick and mentally ill. Louise had a husband Antoine and they both had a child together. They named him Michael. Then in 1625 Michael became sick and died leaving her alone to look after her husband and herself. Later Antoine died and she became friends with St Vincent de Paul. She became a Nun and with the help of St Vincent de Paul started the order of Daughters of Charity and visited sick and poor people. Then in 1660 sadly she died on the 15th of March. Her feast day is the 15th of March.

Fredric Ozanam was born on the 23rd of April, 1813 in Millan, France. His early life was very hard. His

father was a doctor and his mum was an heiress. He was the fifth born of 14 children but he was 1 of the four that survived early childhood. Ten of his siblings died from being sick.. Fredric Ozanam went to school at the University of Paris and studied to become a lawyer and a professor. With his fellow students he started a charity later known as the Society of St Vincent de Paul. Ozanam then died on the 8th of September, 1853 due to a disease called tuberculosis. And to this day, he and his friends are known for starting the St Vincent de Paul's Society.

Blessed Rosalie Rendu By: Alisha, Sofia, Alicia, Madison, Stella, Savannah and Ashley

Blessed Rosalie Rendu was born in Confort, France on the 9th September 1786. She was the eldest of 4 girls in her family. When she was 3 there was war and her father and baby sister died in the war. She was sent to boarding school for 2 years and decided to start working as a Daughter of Charity Nun. She was friends with Fredric Ozanam and his friends and she
