#### **Electronic School Report at SFS**

All children will be receiving their Semester Two school Report on Friday (13th December). As in Semester one, the report will arrive electronically to the Parent Portal. The Specialist overview will be sent home via Flexibuzz.

On **<u>Friday 13 December 2019 at 3pm</u>** you will be able to login to the Parent Portal on nForma, and view your child's report. New families this semester will receive an email with a generic password and login. Families who received the report electronically in Semester one can view each child's report by entering the username and password as you did in Semester one.

**Forgotten passwords:** If you have forgotten your password, please follow the 'forgotten password' link. Please note that your new password needs to be at least 7 characters long and must include at least one non alpha-numeric character, e.g. \*, - / or similar.

If you have requested a password reset and the email does not appear, please look in your junk/spam folder for an email from <u>no-reply@nforma.com.au</u>.

A Quick Guide to the Parent Portal to help you navigate to your child's report will be found on Flexibuzz for your reference. If after following these steps, you are still experiencing difficulty please contact the school during school hours.

I thank the staff for all their work in writing these reports. This is not an easy task and teachers spend countless hours examining the evidence of learning to write constructive comments to describe the learning of each child and indicate the next learning goals. Reports are not the end of learning but are an essential part of the learning cycle. The report should provide clear guidelines of ways the child can progress to the next step on their learning continuum. If you have any questions please come and see the teacher.

#### Home Group for 2020

A certificate will be sent home with your child on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> December with the details of your child's Home Group for 2020.

Thanks to the staff team that has spent countless hours working out the 2020 class groups. Teachers have kept in mind friendships, special needs, personalities, students needs for adjustments to learning, support required academically, physically, socially or emotionally. #### Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.'

#### Matthew 3: 1–12

As we come into this Second week of Advent we hear the call of John the Baptist to 'Prepare the Way for the Lord'. We also look again at the calendar which now says DECEMBER and see that there are only so many days left and so much to do, that we can allow ourselves to get caught up in the business of preparing everything for everyone else, except the Lord. There's final presents to purchase, with decorations to be hung, cards to be written and sent and food to be planned and prepared. So, where in all this is there time and the space to prepare for the Lord?

In Matthew's Gospel, we learn of John's continued warning for us to be ready for Jesus when he comes again. It is not enough that we are sons and daughters of Abraham, but by our own desire, we want to live a life pleasing to God. The Gospel challenges us to bear fruit. It was not enough for the Sadducees nor is it enough for us to simply follow the rules and rituals of our faith. The very actions of lives must show what we believe about our faith.

We Christians come in daily contact with other people whether at work, in our neighborhoods, or school. We have opportunities throughout the day to witness to our faith by our actions and words, but what greater audience do we have than our own children? They watch us and listen to us. They imitate our every action and mimic our expressions. It is important that we witness our faith to all we meet, but no audience is more important than our families. Sometimes we need to take some quiet "desert time" like we find in this coming week's Gospel in order to focus our lives more intentionally on what is truly important.

Continue using the Advent wreath as a tool for prayer. Light the second candle today and offer one suggestion of something you will do this week to take some quiet, reflective time. Think of at least one way you (individually or as a family) will create peace for yourself or someone near you.

#### **BeYou**

**BeYou** is a framework for educators to promote positive mental health for all members of the school community. This week's fact sheet from the **BeYou** website is all about transitions.

#### Understanding behaviour

It's normal for children and young people to have strong feelings

about an upcoming transition, such as excitement about the prospect of going to a new school, as well as nervousness about what lies ahead. Many children and young people may also feel sad or angry about leaving their current learning environment and the positive relationships they've established with educators and each other.

#### Common feelings children and young people have during transition can include:

- excitement
- sadness
- anger
- anticipation
- fear or anxiety.

Understanding and helping children and young people to handle the feelings will help to reduce their stress and can provide them with positive coping strategies. Children and young people often have difficulty explaining in words how they are feeling – instead they might show their feelings through their behaviour.

#### Behaviours you might observe include:

In children transitioning to primary school – clinging behaviour, restlessness, withdrawal, anxiousness, refusal to comply, avoidance, planning and organisation difficulties, crying and tantrums, regression to younger behaviours, volatility.

In transitioning to secondary school – withdrawal or difficulty participating in class discussions, low confidence or self-esteem, regression to younger behaviours, avoidance of tasks, short temper or behavioural concerns, friendship issues or isolation.

Families might also notice issues such as changes in eating habits (low appetite or overeating), difficulties falling asleep, feeling unwell (for example, sore stomach or headaches) or difficulty separating from family members.





#### **Student Well-Being**

Encompassing: Student Engagement, Student Connectedness, Classroom Climate, Inclusion and Prevention to Intervention.

#### These could be typical behaviours

Many of these behaviours are typical for children and young people as they adjust to their new environment, but educators and families need to show understanding and support to help them settle in. By discussing such behaviours with families, you'll gain a sense of whether they are unusual for the child or young person and make an accurate assessment of their support needs.

If concerning behaviours persist, it's important to get help to identify possible underlying problems such as mental health issues or academic difficulties. You may need to seek advice from the school wellbeing team or external health and community professionals.

#### Seasons for Growth

Seasons for Growth is an evidence-based change, loss and grief education program that uses the imagery of the seasons to illustrate the experience of grief. Children and young people can experience grief following significant changes and losses:

Someone they love dies Family changes Separation Friendship changes Illness impacts their life Relocation Moving school or house Natural disasters



Seasons for Growth aims to strengthen the social and emotional wellbeing of children and young people who have experienced major loss and life changes by:

Exploring the impact of change and loss on every-day life Learning new ways to respond to these changes.

I have recently retrained as a Seasons for Growth companion and I will be starting groups in term 1 in 2020. The program runs over 9 weeks and each session goes for around 40 minutes. #### **Respectful Relationships**

At SFS, we implement the Respectful Relationships program. Respectful Relationships is a whole school approach that promotes a culture of equality and respect to end Family Violence for future generations. This will be achieved by reviewing existing practices and culture as well as delivering an evidence based social and emotional learning program that supports resilience, respect and equality. # Walking and cycling detour on South Gippsland Highway near Evans Road

As part of the Hallam Road Upgrade, we're adding an extra lane in each direction on Hallam Road between Ormond Road and South Gippsland Highway and upgrading intersections to make your journey safer and more reliable.

We're preparing the interzection at South Gippsland Highway between Hallam Road and Evans Road for the new traffic lights.
